NATIVE AMERICAN & NATIVE ALASKAN HERITAGE MONTH

As we recognize Native Americans/Native Alaska Heritage Month. We honor Chief siʔał (Chief Seattle or Si'ahl) for whom Seattle is named, who was a leader of the Suquamish and Duwamish people (1786 – 1866). The name "Seattle" is an Anglicization of Si'ahl (1780-1866), the most famous dxwdaw?abš chief. Si'ahl's mother Sholeetsa was dxwdaw?abš and his father Shweabe was chief of the the Suquamish Tribe. It is said that Si'ahl was born at his mother's dxwdaw?abš village of Stukw on the Black River, in what is now the city of Kent (https://www.duwamishtribe.org/chief-siahl). Internationally respected, Chief siʔał's legacy and influence on ethics, spirituality and environmentalism continues to live on today. Seattle resides on the Coast Salish lands. Please take advantage of the opportunity to hear directly from those who can tell the stories of contributions, history, culture and the journeys from lived experiences. ~ Sue Byers
